

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE IN EDUCATION WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

We are all responsible for the welfare of children and keeping their environment safe, whatever our job.

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is:

- protecting children from maltreatment
- preventing impairment of children's health or development
- ensuring that children grow up with the provision of safe and effective care
 - taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO?

Know the different types of abuse so that you can identify children who may be in need of protection.

REFERRALS

Any member of staff can

make a referral to children's

social care, but they should

inform the designated

safeguarding lead

(Chris Orridge) as soon as

possible.

You must read: Keeping Children safe in Education part 1 and Annex A as well as the Staff Code of Conduct Policy.

STAFF BEHAVIOUR

If you are concerned about the behaviour of any staff member or volunteer, you should speak to the headteacher. Concerns about the headteacher should be reported to the Chair of Governors (Jo Twelves) via the school office and you should follow the LADO process If a teacher suspects FGM has been carried out on a child, they must report it to the police.

WHISTLEBLOWING

If you are worried about poor/unsafe safeguarding practices, talk to the designated safeguarding lead (Chris Orridge), the deputy safeguarding officer (Liane Kemp) or the Chair of Governors (Jo Twelves).

STAFF MUST: Log all concerns about children on 'My Concern'. Log all concerns about staff on 'Confide'.
